PUBLIC NOTICE REGARDING NON COMPLIANCE WITH A TREATMENT TECHNIQUE

The following Public Notice is required by the regulations of the New York State Department of Health (NYS DOH):

The Village of Briarcliff Manor has a stipulation agreement with the New York State Department of Health (NYS DOH) for obtaining a portion of its drinking water from the New Croton Aqueduct (NCA). The Village primarily uses this water source from May 15 to September 15, during the Village's high demand months. This drinking water is not filtered.

The Village has been working for several years on a Full Water Supply Project which will bring the Village into compliance with the appropriate Federal regulations. More specifically, the Village has retained the services of Hazen and Sawyer to design a High Lift Pump Station, Aqueduct Connection and Metering Facility at the Tarrytown Lakes site, in Tarrytown, New York. A 30 inch transmission main from the Tarrytown Lakes site to the Rosecliff Water Storage Tank, in Briarcliff Manor, New York will also be constructed, The Full Supply Water Project, once constructed will allow the Village of Briarcliff Manor to obtain its drinking water from the Catskill Aqueduct and be in compliance with the required standards.

It is anticipated that construction will span from spring 2009 to spring 2011. This public notice will be sent to all of the Village's water customers twice a year until the Village complies with the appropriate Federal regulations and the NYSDOH stipulation agreement

The NYS DOH sets drinking water standards and has determined that the presence of microbiological contaminants is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. **Required testing on a regular basis performed by the Village indicates that the water supplied to the consumer is absent of microbiological contamination.**

If water is inadequately treated, microbiological contaminants in that water may cause disease. Disease symptoms may include diarrhea, cramps, nausea and possibly jaundice, and any associated headaches and fatigue. These symptoms, however, are not just associated with disease-causing organisms in drinking water but may be caused by a number of factors other than your drinking water.

The New York State Department of Health has set enforceable requirements for treating drinking water to reduce the risk of these adverse health affects. Treatment such as filtering and disinfecting the water removes or destroys microbiological contaminants.


